From the Senior Warden

Lent is a Season for Healing

Lent is a season for healing. The Cambridge English Dictionary has two definitions for healing: The process of becoming well again, especially after a cut or other injury, or of making someone well again. I think this is probably the first thing that most people think of when we hear the word "healing", especially these days when the coronavirus, COVID-19, pervades every aspect of our lives. The second definition is the process in which a bad situation or painful emotion ends or improves. I

believe that we are starting to see this type of healing emerge from the current pandemic. There is a greater sense of unity across the country. Our staunch political divisions that were on a continual ramp up are now fading into the background. Divisions due to race, ethnicity, religious beliefs are all waning in the shadow of the virus. Households are remembering, or perhaps for the first time learning, what it is like to work, cook, laugh and play together. Americans are now working together to champion this one cause of overcoming the pandemic.

Moreover, the world is coming together in support of one another. If you haven't yet seen the video of the Germans singing the Italian national anthem in solidarity for Italy, I would encourage you to do so. It is a video that shows the beauty that arises when we work to build each other up rather than tear each other down (see Ephesians 4:29). I am praying for healing on a daily basis. RISING HOPE IN GREAT NEED

During this COVID 19 Virus epidemic. Rising Hope Mission Church, at 8220 Russell Road, Alexandria, needs your support now more than ever. They are balancing the need to keep the staff safe and socially distanced from those coming with need. Yet still hundreds of families depend on the food pantry because the jobs they have do not pay enough to feed their families. Now their jobs are in jeopardy and many have already started to lose their service jobs. The demand for food from the pantry will increase as employees are laid-off and furloughed. This hits low-wage, hourly paid workers who have no resources to get over this period the most. Rising Hope serves nearly 300 families a week with its food pantry. The food they supply provides for more than 200,000 meals a year in our community. The demand is only going to get worse.

Rising Hope Needs:

- An increase in food pantry donations from all sources.
- Paper bags to pre-bag the groceries to limit contact.
- Volunteers to bag food. (You do not have to come into contact with those coming for food).
- Volunteers to deliver food to shut-ins. (You can leave at their door)
- Volunteers for the hypothermia shelter.
- Financial denotations always give the most flexibility. They need extra supplies and extra hours for custodial staff to do a deeper cleaning.

Choir Notes

Dear St. James' friends,

When I wrote briefly about three hymn writers that we celebrated in February, I never would have thought that I might be returning to one of them in April. But I find myself drawn back to George Herbert - poet, priest, musician, member of parliament, orator, and scholar, to mention a few of the accomplishments of his too-short life (1593-1633).

Last summer, I was privileged to attend a choral course at Cambridge University. On our first day of seminars, we sat in the chapel of Trinity College - coincidentally, Herbert's own college - and were led in discussion by the Rev. Dr. Malcolm Guite. I don't think it is a mere coincidence that he, like George Herbert, is a poet, priest, musician and scholar. He serves as chaplain of Girton College, Cambridge. According to his Wikipedia biography, "as an academic, Guite describes the focus of his research interests as "the interface between theology and the arts, more specifically Theology and Literature" and 'special interests in Coleridge and C. S. Lewis' as well as J.R.R. Tolkien and British poets."

This Lent, I have been receiving daily devotions from Malcolm Guite. During the week, he has been sharing sonnets he has written in response to George Herbert's poem, "Prayer", in his new collection of poems, "After Prayer." I find that this one, "Heaven in Ordinary," particularly demands sharing at this time. I hope you enjoy it. Heaven in Ordinary

Because high heaven made itself so low
That I might glimpse it through a stable door,
Or hear it bless me through a hammer blow,
And call me through the voices of the poor,
Unbidden now, its hidden light breaks through
Amidst the clutter of the every day,
Illuminating things I thought I knew,
Whose dark glass brightens, even as I pray.

Then this world's walls no longer stay my eyes, A veil is lifted likewise from my heart, The moment holds me in its strange surprise, The gates of paradise are drawn apart, I see his tree, with blossom on its bough, And nothing can be ordinary now.

May we continue to receive the blessings of inspired poets and songwriters who, in nurturing each other's creativity, nurture us.

We Now Have Online Giving!

Church is closed and you're staying indoors, keeping your social distance. So how are you going to make your weekly and monthly gifts to support the church? Well, we're glad you asked! St. James' now is able to receive on-line donations right from the church website: www.stjamesmv.org



St. James' has partnered with myEoffering in order to provide you with the convenience of online contribution. Online contribution refers to a process much like online bill pay, whereby donors opt to have their financial contributions to the church withdrawn directly from their credit, debit, checking, or savings account in lieu of bringing cash or paper checks each Sunday.

Many people are worried about the security of their financial data. Know that myEoffering observes strict security measures. They have passed all the required tests to be fully compliant with the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standards. This means that they are using the latest technologies available to protect against would-be data thieves. They process electronic donations for many churches in the United States, including many of our neighboring churches.

myEoffering has designed a secure, web-based platform in which donors may privately and prayerfully make one-time or recurring donations. Prayerful consideration of giving to God first enables you to witness a powerful sense of stewardship. You can customize a completely individual method of giving, based on how and when you receive your income - whether it be bi-weekly, monthly, or semi-monthly. By setting up recurring donations to be automatically debited from your account, it allows the church to better plan budgets and expenditures and provides a more accurate financial forecast. It also enables you to stay on the path of your contribution goals by ensuring that even if you are unable to attend church on a particular Sunday, you needn't worry about remembering to make that contribution the following week. With more consistent stewardship, our church is able to focus more on the ministry of God.

Finally, as a way for you to symbolically present your myEoffering at the altar during a Sunday morning service, you will find in the pews myEoffering slips for you to place in the plate during the Offertory when the ushers take up the collection.

It is easy to register and use, and is immediately available by visiting the church website: www.stjamesmv.org. When you sign in, please consider these three things:

- 1) Please consider paying for the fees associated with your payment. An ACH bank fee is only 30cents, less than the cost of first class stamp. You can also donate by credit card, but in addition to the 30 cent transaction fee, there is a charge of 2.75%, which takes a significant part of your gift.
- 2) There may be a several-day delay between when you make a donation and when the church receives it. For example, if you donate \$100 pledge donation on March 29, it may not hit our bank until April 1 or beyond. You may want to schedule your monthly donations earlier in each month.
- 3) If you make a donation on-line for a specific purpose, please follow-up with a phone call or email to the church office to let us know, so we can handle it correctly.

Keeping up your financial support of the church is critical during this time when we are not able to gather. Mailing your checks to the church is encouraged, but we hope that on-line giving will be an easy alternative. Just click the new "Give Now" button on our web site.
