

Dear People of St. James',

The Gospel according to Mark boldly proclaims "the beginning of the Good News of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." By this Mark does not mean Christmas and the birth of the baby Jesus. Mark's gospel begins the good news with Jesus' baptism. Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee to be baptized by John, "and just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a days on him. And a vaice same from heaven. "You are my Son the



This is where the story begins for Mark—at the moment when Jesus experienced the ultimate truth of God. Jesus saw through the veil of life to know the essence of heaven. Jesus heard God's voice, acknowledging him as his Beloved Son.

And Jesus' ministry flows from this experience, as he shows and teaches his followers to know for themselves that God is love and that God loves us as his own. Jesus sought to restore those who believed they were unworthy, and to chastise those who disregarded God's love.

The truth that Jesus perceived at his baptism was the truth that defined the rest of his life. He experienced a radical unity with God—"the Father and I are one"—and he sought to bring each of us into that same relationship.

Not many of us will experience the heavens torn apart. And we may not hear God's voice speaking his words of love to us. But we know through faith that God's love for us is the reality that lies behind the "normal" lives that we live. And we can be lifted up by God's love into transformed lives of our own.

We are God's Beloved children: come, let us adore him. Charles+

Growth at St. James'

Invite Welcome Connect (IWC) is a program being initiated in many Episcopal Churches, as a way to promote growth. Fr. Charles and nine of our members attended a one-day conference in October, to learn the principles of this program. We were privileged to have Mary Parmer, creator and facilitator of IWC speak to us at St. James' the next day. Her message? Simply put, that we are called as members of Christ's church to Invite and Welcome people into our midst and then continue to Connect with them on any number of levels, even as they become long term members of St. James'.



This is no easy task. Maybe it requires going out of your way, out of your comfort zone, taking time out of your day to **Invite** someone to join you at church. The **Welcome** part can and seems to be the easiest of the three. especially at St. James'! Connecting with a newcomer initially, and continuing to keep them connected, is possibly the biggest challenge we face.

Those who attended the IWC conference have agreed to come together as an IWC committee, to take the ideas they brainstormed at the conference and turn them into initiatives for growth at St. James'. Some initiatives will be noticed right away, while others will be subtle. Growth occurs when our seed is planted through outreach and service outside of St. James', so there will be initiatives in those areas, as well.

Some of the initiatives you may see or learn about are: Children's welcome bags with coloring pages, Revival of the photo board, Cleaning up the church grounds, Creation of a labyrinth on church grounds, Reading to residents in assisted living facilities, *Theology on Tap* (a way to reach people on a more casual, social level), Young Professionals group, and more!

It is exciting to see what new things are coming and will continue to come at St. James' from Invite Welcome Connect! Thank you to all who will help to grow St. James'!

Highlights of the 223rd Annual Convention of the Diocese of Virginia

More than 330 lay and clerical delegates from across the Diocese gathered at Christ Church, Glen Allen, Saturday for the 223rd Annual Convention of the Diocese of Virginia.

The Convention delegates voted to approve Bishop Shannon Johnston's call, with the consent of the Standing Committee, for the election of a second Bishop Suffragan. The election of the new bishop is expected to be held within the next 18 months. The new suffragan will succeed Assistant Bishop Ted Gulick, who is retiring at the end of this year.



The new Bishop Suffragan will maintain a primary office in Northern Virginia and will become the third full-time bishop, joining Bishop Johnston and Bishop Goff.

The Convention delegates passed 10 additional resolutions addressing a broad range of issues including combating wage theft; prevention of opioid addiction; improving public transportation; and family leave for church employees. Delegates passed a balanced budget which includes increased funding for campus ministries. In his Pastoral Address, Bishop Johnston made a special appeal to each of the churches to increase its pledge to the diocesan budget by 2.5% or \$25 per \$1,000 currently given to the Diocese. Bishop Shannon pointed to three specific needs: employing college chaplains for all universities in the Diocese; supporting fledgling and small mission congregations; and improving compensation to attract and retain diocesan staff.

Also in his Pastoral Address, Bishop Johnston spoke about the role of the Church in racial reconciliation. "We learned from Charlottesville that when the Church shows up and takes a stand, people notice and are themselves strengthened to oppose any form of injustice or inhumanity." The Convention closed with a tribute to Bishop Gulick, who was also the homilist at the Holy Eucharist. Bishop Gulick will retire to his farm in Fauquier County and looks forward to continuing in an active role with the Diocese.

Choir Notes

Dear St. James' Friends,


As Christmas comes to your home and heart, what do you see; what do you hear? Songs of Advent and Christmas ask these questions, too. Do you see what I see? Do you hear what I hear? When we reach the celebration of Christ's birth with services on Christmas Eve, the choir will provide some answers to these questions. In the choral prelude to the 10pm service, we will look from different perspectives: of the animals we place at the manger based on the scripture in Isaiah and Luke and those of Jesuit missionaries and First Nations people, as we sing O Magnum Mysterium by the late Renaissance Spanish composer, Tomás Luis de Victoria, and Huron Carol, a traditional Canadian carol from the mid-17th century. In the first, we hear the words, "O great mystery and wonderful sacrament, that animals should see the new-born Lord, lying in a manger." Huron Carol paints images of Jesus born in a lodge of broken bark and wrapped in a robe of rabbit skin. Hunters heard the hymn of the angels, and chiefs from afar brought gifts of fox and beaver pelt. I am reminded that although we worship according to our certain traditions, there are many equally valid traditions and perspectives. A Christmas carol written by American Alfred Burt reminds us, "some children see Him lily white",

bright with heavenly grace, and filled with holy light." The animals seem to claim their roles in the Nativity: the donkey who carried Mary; the cow who gave a manger for a bed; the sheep who gave wool for warmth; and the doves who cooed a lullaby.

Christmas is coming. What do you see? What do you hear? Gloria in excelsis!
