Choir Notes

Dear St. James' friends,

As I write this, several events and thoughts are converging for me. First, Thanksgiving Day is rapidly approaching, traditionally marked with family feasts and stories of hardship and a great celebration of the thanksgiving by the Pilgrims at Plymouth Plantation. Second, as we look around, we find ourselves pilgrims negotiating our way through the midst of a landscape pockmarked by war, anxiety, cultural division, and pandemic. Third, I had the opportunity yesterday to observe the thesis defense by a fellow student finishing his doctoral program. His writing discussed Christian pilgrimage and the significance of song in that experience. So how do those come together as we enter the season of Advent?

I had never thought really about the life of the church being one of pilgrimage, but I believe my colleague rightly points out that pilgrimage has been a part of our heritage since Biblical times. Certainly, Exodus describes a great pilgrimage. We hear of pilgrimages to the Holy Land, to Rome, or to walk the Camino de Santiago (the way of St. James) across Spain. There are pilgrimages to Iona in Scotland and to the Taizé community in France. People of other faiths make pilgrimages to their sacred sites, like the Hajj to Mecca, or visits to the Temple Mount in Jerusalem. I suggest that even as we are making our pilgrim way through the desolation of COVID-19, we are reentering our vital annual pilgrimage to a stable in Bethlehem, where we will again find a child lying in a manger. We have traversed many dark and bumpy roads since we last made the pilgrimage; we look again to a beckoning light.

Oddly enough, I had a recent encounter with pilgrimage from another aspect: I was studying a particular hymn, "Brother, sister, let me serve you" ("The Servant Song") (1977), written by New Zealander Richard Gillard (b. 1953). You may remember it—we have sung it in church on occasion. Gillard saw our Christian journey as a pilgrimage of service and fellowship. Two phrases of Gillard's text seem particularly appropriate to our situation: "We are pilgrims on a journey, fellow trav'llers on the road" and "I will hold the Christ-light for you in the night-time of your fear." As we make our darkened journey toward the manger this Advent, may we keep the pilgrim songs of our forebears in our hearts, be hopeful, and hold the Christ-light up high for each other and for all the world to see.

Highlights of the 226rd Annual Convention of the Diocese of Virginia

For the first time in 226 years, the Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia gathered not in person, but online. More than 450 delegates attended the November 14 Convention via Zoom.

Budget

The Convention delegates considered a budget presented by the Executive Board which reflected cuts necessary to balance the budget anticipating receipts of approximately 15% less giving by parishes to the Diocese. The budget featured increased funding for the work of race and reconciliation but also numerous cuts in virtually all other areas due to anticipated reduced giving to the Diocese. Budget amendments were proposed to restore funding for campus ministries to be funded by a hardship waiver of giving to The Episcopal Church. After an extended discussion the Convention declined to approve the budget and thereby referred the budget back to the Executive Board.

Resourcing God's Mission

The Task Force on Resourcing God's Mission in the Diocese of Virginia, led by the Rev. Sven vanBaars, addressed the gap between opportunities and funding of God's mission by naming the patterns of giving in our diocese while comparing those patterns to other dioceses, learning about giving from our congregations, and exploring ways to increase giving. The new giving plan would ask all congregations to commit to a covenant of giving that dedicates 10% of pledge and plate income to the ministry of the Diocese of Virginia. Those congregations that are not giving at this covenantal level would engage in a process of conversation about congregational growth and possibly a waiver. The task force suggests putting forward a resolution at the 227th Annual Convention that would replace the Virginia Plan for Proportional Giving with what we are currently calling the "Virginia Covenantal Giving Plan".

Delegates to Convention passed the following resolutions:

- R-1 Updating Rules to Assure Fairness In Virtual Church Governance Meetings
- R-2 Stipendiary Clergy Parental Leave Equity
- R-3 Resolution to Authorize an Election of a Bishop Diocesan

Highlights of Bishop Goff's Pastoral Address

In her pastoral address, the Rt. Rev. Susan Goff, Bishop Suffragan and Ecclesiastical Authority, illuminated the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on church life and diocesan ministry this year. The Bishop's office directed all of its energies into providing support and resources to clergy and vestries as they worked to lead congregations through the dual pandemics of COVID and nationwide racial crisis.

"Even as these new priorities demand our focus, we have not abandoned the four priorities we named last year," said Bishop Goff. The four priorities remain: healing across differences; resourcing God's mission, care of God's creation and evangelism.

She reported that the Task Force on Resourcing God's Mission has identified a plan to strengthen giving from congregations to the diocesan budget. At the same time, the Diocese is "actively at work to find ways to unrestrict some funds and to sell undeveloped land where we don't anticipate planting a new congregation. These efforts, along with strengthening giving from congregations, will put us in stronger financial health in years to come."

On a personal note, Bishop Goff announced that she is now cancer free. The Bishop was diagnosed with breast cancer in February and underwent surgery, months of chemotherapy and radiation. She said she felt blessed to have been able to work full-time through the course of treatment.

In the season of advent we celebrate four themes: hope, peace, love and joy. The birth of Jesus brings us all these themes, regardless of how or where we celebrate. So, I wish you all hope; that God's hand is watching over all of you in the midst of the challenges of 2020. I will you all peace, in knowing that His plan for you is already in motion. I wish you all love, that no matter how near or far your family and friends may be from you, that you feel enveloped in their love and the love of Christ. I wish you all joy in celebrating the birth of Jesus and our salvation through this miracle.

From Mary, Administration & Finance

The last time I wrote a December newsletter was December 2018 and my opening line was "What a year. I think I could just type that and almost everyone reading this would know what I mean." Who knew that it would apply again this year! As Administration and Finance, my year was focused on the St. James' budget, getting together an audit committee, ensuring our stewardship season took place, as well as doing my duties as Vestry Member of the Day on my assigned Sundays. What I did not know at the beginning of my term was that everything I would normally be doing, I would be doing from home and VOD does not translate into the virtual world.



We are working on the 2021 budget to be presented at the annual meeting. Thank you to everyone who made their commitment during the Stewardship Campaign. Budget preparations are much easier when pledges are in hand. I am so delighted to report that we are close to our 2020 numbers in pledges, with only being shy by a few thousand dollars as of the end of November. If you were not able to turn in a pledge card for 2021, there is still time! If you wanted to submit a pledge card but are unable to, thank you for considering St. James' and know that your presence as part of our church family is a gift.

For expenditures, we have moved our request process to virtual. While we no longer fill out the chit sheet in person to be signed off, Jenny does prepare one, emails it to me, and I approve via email. I am proud that we have kept up our accounting procedure even in a pandemic. Due to COVID-19, we have postponed the audit until March, to be able to do the 2019 and 2020 audit at one time. The Diocese has granted extensions and it allows us to be able to run our audit in a safer environment.
