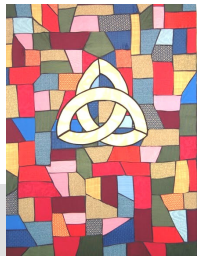

# STUDY FOR LENT 2011

## "EMBRACING AN ADULT FAITH"

### Marcus J. Borg on What It Means to Be Christian

**PICTURE THIS:** You have just finished supper with friends in Braxton Hall on a Sunday evening during Lent. Now you sit back, watch and listen as bestselling author and theologian Marcus Borg stimulates thoughtful and heartfelt conversation among a small group of people, captured for you on DVD-based video. The video pauses, so you and others present begin your own discussion. Led by a facilitator, you delve more deeply into the DVD session you just watched and heard. Members of your group become teachers for one another, following a personal, respectful and engaged model of adult learning.

Widely acclaimed by churches that have used it, "*Embracing an Adult Faith*" is an exciting adult study for those seeking a richer understanding of issues in contemporary Christian practice and theology. The subjects of the five-week study are:

<i>Who is God?</i>	March 13
<i>Who was Jesus?</i>	March 20
<i>What is salvation?</i>	March 27
<i>How do we practice our faith?</i>	April 3
<i>How do we live in community?</i>	April 10

The author and leader of this study is Marcus J. Borg, Canon Theologian at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Portland, Oregon. Internationally known in both academic and church circles as a biblical and Jesus scholar, he is the author of 19 books.

Each Sunday evening session will begin with a simple supper of soup and salad, prepared by members of ministries of the parish. The DVD presentation and parish discussion will follow:

## Forgiveness BRACELET


Jesus died on the cross to forgive our sins, and he tells us to forgive other people, too. Make and wear this craft as a reminder that you are forgiven — and should be forgiving.

### What you need:


- Clear plastic bottle (about 16 oz.)
- An adult to help
- Scissors
- Construction paper
- Permanent black marker
- Glue or clear tape
- Thin ribbon or yarn
- Small hole punch

### What you do:

1. Remove any label from the bottle. Have an adult help you cut the bottle in half, width-wise. At the middle, cut out two identical half-inch-wide strips.
2. Cut out paper the same size as the plastic strips.
3. On the paper, write "Forgive, and you will be forgiven" (Luke 6:37, NIV).
4. Place the paper between the two plastic strips.
5. Cut and glue the ribbon or yarn to run along the top and bottom of the verse, framing the words.
6. Punch a hole at each end, through all three layers.
7. Tie the bracelet to your wrist with ribbon or yarn.




## WHY FORGIVE?

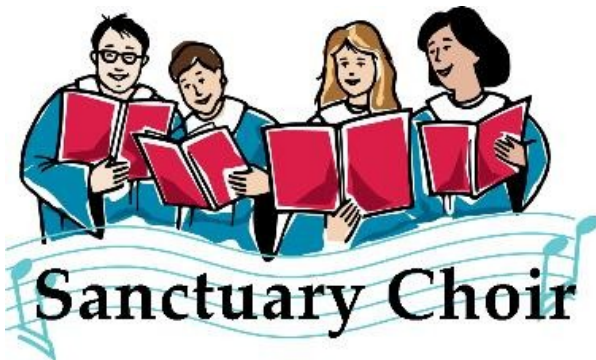
## Singing the Psalms During Lent

*"The Psalms are the hymns of ancient Israel. In them, every mood and emotion of the human heart is given voice, from the heights and ecstasy of praise to the depths and darkness of despair. While the texts of Israel's hymns have survived, sadly the music has not."* (from A Hymn Tune Psalter, Book One, p. v, Church Publishing, NY, 2007.)

On Ash Wednesday, we will recover the experience of singing the Psalms. The choir will lead us in their singing. We will be using newer versions of the sung Psalms that are composed of familiar hymn tunes and simplified chant. These Psalms come from the A Hymn Tune Psalter written by Carl P. Daw, Jr. and Kevin R. Hackett. We will begin by singing an antiphon composed from a familiar hymn tune and follow with the verses of the Psalm sung to a simplified chant. The first portion of the verse (before the asterisk) is sung to the A portion of the chant, and the second portion of the verse is sung to the B portion of the chant. The bold text at the end of each phrase indicates when we move to the second note of the chant.

Carl P. Daw, Jr. and Kevin R. Hackett are both priests and hymn writers. Carl served on the text committee for our current hymnal, *The Hymnal 1982*, and was later on the Standing Commission on Church Music. He is currently executive director of the Hymn Society of the United States and Canada. His hymns texts appear in several collections as well as our hymnal. I was privileged to have attended a music workshop in which Carl spoke of his inspirations for writing hymn texts. Kevin is a member of the Society of St. John the Evangelist in Cambridge, Massachusetts. We find several of his hymn texts in our hymnal supplement, *Wonder, Love and Praise*. They have both enriched the music of the Episcopal church with their gifts.

The congregation is invited to join in the singing of the Psalms as you feel comfortable. We will sing the Psalms through the Fifth Sunday of Lent, so we will have plenty of time to become comfortable with them. Relax and enjoy the solemnity that singing the Psalms can offer to our worship.

## LET US PRAY!

The St. James' family has several forms of corporate prayer. We pray together during our Worship Services. We pray in our daily life. To fulfill the need for specific prayers we have the advantage of two "lists."

The **Parish Prayer List** is published in the weekly Sunday bulletin and the monthly Newsletter, *St. James' Notes*. This "list" asks each of us to pray for those in need. If you would like to include a name or names on the Parish Prayer List, contact the church office at (703) 780-3081 or by email to [office@stjamesmv.org](mailto:office@stjamesmv.org). To return to a more correct format, we are once again only using first names. An exception can be made at the request of the family. We also, ask you to notify the office when to remove the name from the Parish Prayer List. If you have submitted a prayer request to the office in the past, please, review the Parish Prayer List now and let us know if you wish to continue the request or have the name removed. The Parish Prayer List will be revised soon.

Another method of receiving prayers is the **DOK Prayer Chain**. The Daughters of the King, as a part of their vows of Prayer and Service, maintain a Prayer Chain. The request for prayers of thanksgiving, healing, strength and guidance are passed through the "chain" of 17 Daughters. Confidentiality is maintained. Last names are omitted, unless otherwise requested. To submit names to the DOK Prayer Chain, call the church office at (703) 780-3081, notify the Rector or call the Lead Caller (Lead Caller is currently Peg Iber at (703)780-0085).

Through these several types of prayer, the St. James' Family can lift our needs to the Lord.

## **ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

Your are invited to join us in Braxton Hall from 9:15 to 10:00am on Sunday mornings as we discuss the scriptures appointed for worship services that day. We study and discuss God's Word as it was written, and for how it applies to our lives and the life of St. James' today. What path is our Lord calling us to follow?

From January 30 through February 27, we immersed ourselves in the study of Jesus' sayings from the Sermon on the Mount. On March 6 our study will place additional emphasis on those teachings. And on March 13 we will begin our journey through Lent.

### **March 6 - "God's Dazzling Reign" (Focus Scripture: Matthew 17:1-9)**

Today's readings seem an exclamation point to Jesus' teaching about God's realm in the Sermon on the Mount. In a place of sacred mystery, the shining and shadow of Jesus' transfiguration convey holy presence in the community of God's people across time. In this place of silence and witness, Jesus' followers catch a glimpse of God's dazzling reign.

### **March 13 - "God's Abundant Grace" (Focus Scripture: Psalm 32)**

God loves us, no matter what, and continually finds ways to be close to us. As we begin the Season of Lent, we reflect on the ways we seek to hide from God's steadfast ways—the words and deeds that threaten to separate us from God and neighbor. The psalmist prays for forgiveness and celebrates that the Merciful One continues to draw us into the secure place of abundant grace.

### **March 20 - "Bold Blessing" (Focus Scripture: Genesis 12:1-4a)**

During Lent, the lectionary readings from the Hebrew Scriptures trace the story of God's love over centuries of history. As we examine the bold journeys of faith that our ancestors undertook, we can grow in trust and confidence that God is with us, too, as we move into a future that is undefined, but secure in God's keeping.

### **March 27 - "Thirsty Voices" (Focus Scripture: Exodus 17:1-7)**

"Is God among us or not?" is a question running through this Season of Lent. When trouble comes on their journey, the thirsty people quarrel with Moses and question God's presence. With our faith ancestors, we are invited to voice our needs and to help each other. Our hope is the living water of God's love, poured into our hearts.

### **April 3 - "God's Restoring Love" (Focus Scripture: Psalm 23)**

How can we describe God, who is so far beyond human understanding? The psalmist uses the metaphor of shepherd, one who guards and cares for the flock. Even when we are uncertain and afraid, we trust that God is with us to nurture and restore. God's restorative love is shown in Jesus, who brings sight to one born blind and calls all to new ways of living and seeing.

Please join us as we study and discuss these comforting promises from God.
