

Choir Notes

Dear St. James' friends,

The sermon at the St. James's Feast Day online service of Morning Prayer came just at the right time for me. Thank you, Mary Bramley, for not only accepting the challenge to deliver the sermon, but for the excellent message you shared with us.



One of the things Mary shared was what she called "a closely guarded choir secret." Well, I feel like I must respond. First, a disclaimer – the choir is always open to any and all of you who want to be part of the musical leadership of our worship ("no secrets are hid" to borrow a phrase we hear in the collect for purity in the Eucharist service). Please consider joining us when we do have the opportunity to sing together again. Second, as to that choir secret – she let slip that some hymns can be (and are) sung to different tunes than the ones we use from Hymnal 1982! For some of us, that explains why sometimes the words sound familiar, but the tune is not what we remember from another time in our lives. The great fun of that, though, is that we don't like the tune we have, we can look for another that we find easier to sing, or more fitting to the text, or just the one we grew up with. How do we do that? There are several ways. One is to visit a website called Hymnary.org, which catalogs the hymns and tunes used from hundreds of hymnals and allows searches by text, composer, author, tune name, and several other characteristics – even being able to search for a particular note sequence. The more traditional way is to notice that part of the information for each of the hymns in the hymnal is its meter. That's the set of digits at the end of the hymn, like "77. 77 with Alleluias" for "Jesus Christ is risen today." The digits represent the number of syllables in each phrase of the hymn. So this hymn has four, seven-syllable phrases, but with some alleluias included. Of course, there are some special codes that come into play like CM, which stands for Common Meter, and means 86. 86; or CMD, Common Meter Double, which has eight phrases arranged as 86. 86. 86. 0ther special combinations are LM, Long Meter, and SM, Short Meter, as well as the one for stray cats and dogs: Irr(egular). To help in contemplating substitute hymn tunes for a particular text, a "Metrical Index of Tunes" is available in the accompaniment edition of the hymnal. For some hymns, the hymnal editors have already included two versions in the hymnal with different tunes, like "O little town of Bethlehem," (hymns 78 and 79). If you look at the information about those hymns, you will see that they do, in fact, share the same meter, CMD, but have different hymn tune names, "Forest Green" and "St. Louis."

A word of warning, though: just because the numbers work, don't be surprised if a text just doesn't "fit" another tune of the same meter. Other factors may be at play (like how accents fall in the text- do you remember hearing about iambic (short-long) pentameter in high school English? Iambic verse won't fit well with a tune that is set up for dactylic (long-short) meter because the accents are reversed.

There. The secret is out. No sleight of hand – just music. Magic or not, it's fun to explore the hymnal and see what you can learn about our rich hymnody.

From Mary, Administration & Finance





Where we used to see each other in person frequently, we must now settle for virtual worship and fellowship. While our financial situation is not as dire as other churches, we still do not know what the future holds. Sitting in Vestry Meetings, it is easy to read what is black and white and have questions that can not be answered. However, it does not show our story. It does not show the committee that organically formed to work in the yard and those who pledged to create a Garden Fund. Or the guardian angels that have come through to help with surprise maintenance issues. Or why, even in the midst of a global pandemic, we still meet on Sundays, for Bible study on

Potomac Region Racial Justice Committee

The Potomac Region Racial Justice Committee has been hard at work since June. Over 1,500 postcards were sent across the country reminding people to register to vote and the deadlines for absentee voting. They also set up a phone bank just before the election. challenge.
