Choir Notes

Dear St. James' Friends,

Last October, we took a quick look at some of the features of hymns. One of the things we noted was that hymns are poetry and have meter. This called to mind terms like iambic pentameter that we studied in high school English class. But that's not the only way we look at meter.



I was recently asked about the "little numbers at the bottom of the page below the hymn – like 76.76 D." This is the other way of looking at meter. While they are related to the poetic meter, they are distinct from it. The number of digits gives the number of lines in a stanza, and each individual digit gives the number of syllables in the particular line. A "D" means "doubled". So in this example, there would be eight lines in the stanza, and there would alternately be seven, then six, syllables in the line. Some meters occur so frequently in our hymnody that they have been given special abbreviations: Common Meter (CM) is 86.86; Short Meter (SM) is 66.86; and Long Meter (LM) is 88.88. These can also be doubled (CMD, SMD, LMD).


So what? Have you noticed that there is also a tune name in italics at the bottom of the page – like *Forest Green* or *St. Louis*? The meter gives a clue about possible alternate tunes. Both *Forest Green* and *St. Louis* have a CMD meter. So a hymn of that same meter could be sung to either tune – and in this case, you may know "O Little Town of Bethlehem" to one or both of these tunes (see hymns 78 and 79 in the *Hymnal 1982*). To assist the musician, there is a metrical index of tunes in the back of the hymnal. So it's not magic to substitute alternate hymn tunes or to devise a metrical psalm setting. It's just enjoying the beauty of our hymnody.




Hot Lunches for Rising Hope


Theater Outing on Thursday, October 29

Marjorie Taub, a middle-aged Upper West Side doctor's wife, is devoted to mornings at the Whitney, afternoons at the Museum of Modern Art and evenings at the Brooklyn Academy of Music. Plunged into a mid-life crisis of Medea-like proportions, she's shaken out of her lethargy by the reappearance of a fascinating and somewhat mysterious childhood friend. Filled with passion and humor, the New York Times called The Tale of the Allergist's Wife a "window-rattling comedy of mid-life malaise."
