Choir Notes

Dear Friends.

A friend recently shared a satire about hymns, old and new, albeit in the context of the Lutheran church. The (fake) news article reported the hospitalization of hundreds after a new hymn was introduced in church. All in good fun, but it points out some things to think about. How do hymns get into our hymnal and into our Sunday morning service? An abbreviated answer to the first question is "only after long, careful, prayerful, painstaking consideration by theologians, musicians, clergy, and the people."



A more detailed answer to the second is this. Several weeks before a new season in the church year, I gather together all the lessons for the upcoming Sundays and read and reflect on them. I then prepare, using several published guides along with the results of my reflection and prayer, a list of suggestions for each Sunday and submit those to the Rector, who then reviews and reflects on them and either approves them or sends them back with suggestions or comments, and then we work together to come to final selection. Ultimately, the Rector's decision prevails, as is appropriate given his canonical responsibility to provide for music for the service. During the whole process, we look at how the selections align with the lectionary for the day, how "singable" the songs seem to be, whether they are well known to the parish or need to be introduced as a new hymn that should be in our repertoire. Sometimes we hit home runs ("gee, I really loved the hymns today!" or the sound of people humming or whistling one of the hymn tunes at coffee hour); sometimes we strike out (aka dead silence from the congregation during the hymn). And there are the summer hymn suggestions for those who don't think we consider their favorites. (Actually, I'm happy to have suggestions any time, with the understanding that it may be a year or more before they fit in.)

Back to the article. One of the questions raised in the reporter's investigation was "why weren't congregants warned" ... (ahead of time)? Well, fair warning: in November, look for a new set of service music. We will be singing (and enjoying, I hope) a setting for Holy Communion composed by our neighbor, Peter Crisafulli, minister of music at All Saints Episcopal Church, Chevy Chase. The choir is already becoming familiar with these settings, so they can help lead you in singing your praises with a new song!



News from the Diocese

Bishop Shannon Johnston has announced that he will resign during the November Diocesan Annual Convention. He will fully retire on July 1, 2019, after having served over twelve years as Bishop. In his letter of August 3, Bishop Shannon called for "a new vision and new energy for the Church in our diocese." He also said that "being Bishop of Virginia has been the greatest honor and privilege of my life. I love this diocese with all my heart."

A Bishop Provisional will be elected at the November Convention in Richmond who will serve approximately three years or more if needed. Per the Standing Committee, "The Bishop Provisional will be an experienced Bishop who will have the canonical authority of a Bishop Diocesan, and who will partner with us in a thorough diocesan review to enable us to prepare for a healthy call for our next Bishop Diocesan."


October 13 BBQ, Holiday Yard Sale & Bake Sale



Growth & Evangelism

One of my favorite sayings, that makes my friends and co-workers either smile or groan is: "you never know where *Jesus is.*" I usually say it when something works out just perfectly, or in a way that is needed. Such as when I am running late to a meeting and the light turns green, or when I need a 2pm pick me up and a meeting has leftover snacks and coffee.

But, I think my favorite times is to recall stories to friends about when Jesus was there unexpectedly. Such as when we found out about my dad's accident and my mom called her cousin, my Uncle John, who lived in Texas. When my Aunt Adele answered the phone, she said John is in D.C. for work. Having another family member there right away was truly a moment that Jesus shined into our lives. Or when several St. James' members brought food over in coming weeks to make it that much easier for a new family of nine.

I see it all the time at St. James', I am reminded of when the wife of a choir member called Alan, to alert him of an accident, and several of us were able to spring into action. Whether it was going to the hospital or making casseroles. Or when a parishioner has a new baby and we bring food and gifts. How, by serving a hot meal at Rising Hope Mission Church, we are Jesus in the moment for a person in need in our community. I also think to my sister, Aimee's, recent incident. After hearing a lot of 'ifs' and sending out a text message, just before midnight, that alerted Charles to get to the hospital as my family was arriving. The prayers, calls, visits, well wishes were all moments of Jesus being there with us, that made Aimee a walking miracle.

I think to even the simpler things, pointing out which verse we are in the hymnal or sharing my prayer book with my pew neighbors are all ways I try to be Jesus for someone in that moment. When I see my fellow brother or sister in Christ welcoming someone new, or walking a parishioner back to their car, I am reminded that Jesus is here. It is not always the big actions, Jesus teaches us that even the smallest act can be the biggest act of love for the person next to you.
