### Dear People of St. James',

The church doors opened. The organ music swelled. The people stood and raised their voices in song. Triumphant alleluias poured out, as we began to sing the great Easter hymn, "The strife is o'er."

Our first service in-person together, after fourteen months apart,

was a celebration of faith and resurrection. St. James' never stopped being the church, and we never stopped worshipping, and we never stopped being the Body of Christ. But our Christianity is an incarnate faith, embodied in our relationships and our actions. It is hard to sustain that kind of faith while separated from one another. We did it... but oh, how good it is to be once again in the presence of one another, and to see Christ in our gathering.

Our first service together was on the first Sunday after Pentecost, the first Sunday of the long season sometimes known as Ordinary Time. During the six months between Advent and Pentecost, the church remembers and celebrates the key events in the life of Jesus. During the the other six months, we remember the teachings, healings, and miracles that made up the "ordinary" days of Jesus' extraordinary life. And so Ordinary Time reminds us that our own "ordinary" days are lived in the light of God's Truth and Jesus' Resurrection... there is nothing ordinary about them!





### **Choir Notes**

Dear St. James' friends,

"I come with Christians far and near to find, as all are fed, the new community of love in Christ's communion bread"





Here's the story. For our first Sunday back together in person for worship, I wanted to express musically the joy that I felt. One way to do that was in the choice of the postlude: *Toccata* from the Fifth Organ Symphony by Charles-Marie Widor. Soon after that, I was scrolling through a favorite website, which provides listings and links to services of Evensong and Compline in the UK and Ireland. I explored a listing for St. David's Cathedral in Wales and heard the hymn, "Alleluia, sing to Jesus," sung to the Welsh tune, HYFRYDOL. This is a tune we often sing, and in fact will have just sung June 13 as "Love divine, all loves excelling."

When I was practicing and finalizing future prelude, offertory, and postlude selections, I reviewed the scripture readings along with resources that suggest music for each Sunday. One suggestion was the hymn, "For the fruit of all creation, thanks be to God." The setting is EAST ACKLAM, by retired organist and director of music at the York Minster, Francis Jackson. That led me to a piece composed in honor of his ninetieth birthday (he is now 103!) In addition to his compositions, Dr. Jackson is noted for having inspired the use of the Widor *Toccata* (the same one mentioned above) as a concluding voluntary for weddings. And with that, we have come full circle.

So what is it that I see in these random encounters that inspires me to write about them? It is that they bespeak the great community and closeness in which we move in the church – like in the verse from "I come with joy to meet my Lord" with which I opened this note – and which, oddly enough, we recently sang. Put another way, in a verse from Rev. Fred Pratt Green's hymn, "When in our music God is glorified:"

"So has the Church, in liturgy and song, in faith and love, through centuries of wrong, borne witness to the truth in every tongue, Alleluia!"

May we continue to unite with Christians far and wide to sing together and to be inspired by random, or not-so-random, musings to offer our praise to God.

# Flags of St. James'

Have you ever wondered why there are so many flags displayed in St. James' Church? Have you ever heard St. James' referred to as Fort St. James?

First, let me explain the fort nickname. The many flags could be the reason for that nickname. Or, because of the location right outside a gate into Ft. Belvoir, we have had a "military" connection. Many families who have lived on the Post have been part of St. James'. This is also the same for many families in the neighborhood. St. James' welcoming sense has made it good



for folks who may be in the area for a short while to decide to be here. There is an occasional military uniform seen in the congregation. And, we do still sing patriotic hymns for patriotic occasions!

Then, to the flags that are on display. The flags are not military. There are two classifications for the flags. These are Church and State. The church flag, seen by the organ, is the symbol for The Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America. In the back of the church on the organ side are other representations of folks who at one time called St. James' home. There is a flag of the Vatican; two Roman Catholic seminarians studying at Virginia Theological Seminar did their parish work here and donated the flag. A German seminarian gave the flag of her home parish. And we have the flag of the Diocese of Virginia.

The state flags are first represented by our national flag displayed by the hymn board. The state and national flags displayed in the back of the church were given by members of the church who wanted their homeland represented. Many of these were carried in the procession on special Sundays. The first to be mentioned is the state flag of Virginia. We have always had a very international congregation. Australia, Great Britain, Mexico and Germany flags are in the stand at the back.

Feel free to examine the flags and ask questions. Our flags are very much a part of our church's history! *Peg Iber* 

### **Mission & Outreach**

I hope your summer is going to be lovely. We are spending quite a bit of time in our Delaware home. As I write this I am looking at the bay which is full to the brim with water at high tide. It poured here last night and I was so afraid for our osprey and herons that were hunkered down in their nests. We also plan to give back packs to the children of United Community (UC). In August, if you find it in your heart to fill a back pack with school supplies and snacks, I will deliver it to UC. More to follow on this in July.

# **Update on the Rectory**

St. James' has on its property a Rectory, which is a home available for a priest and family. If the Rectory is not used by the priest, then the Rectory is an asset to be used for the good of the church.

For the past nine years, St. James' has been fortunate to rent the Rectory to Ben & Margaret Justesen. The Justesen's recently announced their plans to move to Florida this summer, and the Vestry has been considering options for the Rectory, including whether to continue renting or to sell it.

The Rectory has appreciated greatly in value while providing rental income (\$30,000/yr), and it has an estimated value of \$575,000.

As a rental property the Rectory would continue to appreciate in value (hopefully!) while generating rental income of perhaps \$36,000/yr. Rental expenses include a Property Manager, property taxes, and maintenance.

If the Rectory were to be sold, the proceeds could significantly reduce the church mortgage and associated monthly payments. The mortgage balance currently stands at about \$880,000, and St. James' budgets about \$94,000/yr towards mortgage payments—nearly a third of our budget. Paying down the mortgage could help prepare us for upcoming financial challenges, as we anticipate replacing the aging HVAC system, repaving the driveway, and renewing the older portion of the church roof.

The sale of the Rectory is not something that the Vestry takes lightly, nor is it something that needs to be decided quickly. The process for the County to survey and approve a separate property lot is lengthy and expensive. If the Vestry decided to recommend the sale of the Rectory, then there would be additional meetings to inform the congregation and to answer questions, followed by putting the decision to a congregational vote. Recognizing the long time-frame and the many unanswered questions, the Vestry has decided to rent the Rectory, while continuing to gather information about the pro's, the con's, and the process of selling.

The Rectory suffered significant damage recently when a tree fell on its roof. Fortunately, insurance is covering the cost of fully replacing the roof for \$35,500, less a \$1000 deductible. The Vestry has also consulted several realtors about what would be required to prepare the Rectory either to rent or sell; the realtors estimate \$20,000. In addition, the wooden deck must be replaced, with estimates up to \$13,000. Accordingly, the Vestry has approved the spending of up to \$35,000 from unrestricted funds to prepare the Rectory to rent.
